## Volunteering in Deerfield Cemeteries

This is the most important step, so please do not proceed until you have read this short but very valuable guide.



Pick a cemetery and determine whether it is TOWN OWNED or PRIVATE. Of the 100+ cemeteries in Deerfield, 28 of them are owned by the town. The rest are on private property, and it is best to ask permission before entering.

### CLEANING MONUMENTS

- You must get permission from the cemetery trustees before cleaning headstones or monuments.
- Always try the gentlest method first. A soft brush and some water will often do the job.
- Never use high pressure washers or sand blasters.
- Never use metal tools or wire brushes.
- A toothbrush and a popsicle stick can help safely clean crevices.
- Given advance notice, we can provide you with the approved cleaning solution.

### **OTHER WAYS TO HELP:**

Visit a Deerfield cemetery and contribute or transcribe photos on Find-a-Grave or Billion Graves online.

Identify plants. We would love to know what is growing in our graveyards! Cemeteries often hold rare specimens that have gone undisturbed for centuries because of their location. Take some photos and send your findings to the Trustees.

Report vandalism or other damage to the Trustees.

Support your cemetery trustees at the ballot box. Because Deerfield has not passed a budget in nearly a decade, our cemeteries are suffering. Warrant articles provide funding for general maintenance and specific projects (like the columbarium at Old Center Cemetery on Meetinghouse Hill Road). Your YES vote on these important warrant articles would be a big help!

# GENERAL CEMETERY MAINTENANCE

- Rake and remove leaves, pick up and remove garbage, sticks, and other debris.
- Straighten flags on or near the graves of veterans.
- Dispose of any stray/broken plastic decorations.
- Touch base with the Trustees to let them know you have helped! Photos are always appreciated.

**NOTE:** Leaf blowers are allowed. Tractors, mowers, and other heavy equipment are **NOT** allowed.

Never plant or pull anything without permission from the Trustees.
