Call to Order

1

5:30 pm - Vice Chairman Pitman called the meeting to order

Present: Richard Pitman, Vice Chairman, Fred McGarry, Alden Dill, and Cynthia McHugh, Selectmen.

Absent: Andrew Robertson, Chairman

Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag

Vice Chairman Pitman asks all to rise and pledge allegiance to the Flag

Vice Chairman Pitman: For the record, Andy Robertson, Chairman, is not with us this evening.

Alden Dill, Fred McGarry, Cindy McHugh and myself are here.

We will start off with the opening of the salt shed build and road recon and paving bids and then we will get right to you, Jeff.

Salt Shed Addition:

Mr. Harrington: There were no salt shed addition bids submitted.

Vice Chairman Pitman: Okay.

Selectman Dill: Do we readvertise that or what is our plan, then?

Mr. Harrington: It is up to the Board.

Selectman Dill: I think that we are going to have to do that.

Vice Chairman Pitman: The nice thing is that we have plenty of time and inclement kind of watch to see if prices

decline a little bit.

I think if we bring it up again in October.

Selectwoman McHugh: So, do you want to wait a little while before we put it out to for a new bid?

Vice Chairman Pitman: Yes.

Selectman Dill: I think that October will be a little late.

Selectman McGarry: Yeah.

Selectman Dill: Probably more Septemberish.

Vice Chairman Pitman: We will have John mark on his calendar for right after Labor Day, we will see where the

prices have gone and ...

Mr. Harrington: So, are we thinking September?

Vice Chairman Pitman: Yes, seems the consensus.

Mr. Harrington: And, that brings us to the road reconstruction material.

Selectman Dill: It is different materials. We are right back to apples and oranges between three bids because we didn't get stone and we didn't get reclaim on that one so there is not much to match up ...

Mr. Harrington: The RFB does not ask for reclaim. Deerfield Sand and Gravel put it in.

Selectman Dill: Okay.

So, what did we have in the RFB, just the inch and a half processed?

Mr. Harrington: Inch and a half-processed gravel, three quarter inch processed gravel, three inch minus bank run, one and a half inch minus erosion stone, three quarter inch minus erosion stone and six inch minus erosion stone.

Mr. Harrington: Next would be the paving bids.

Ms. Libby: Is he able to speak or how does that function?

Mr. Harrington: Yes, he can speak. He has himself muted right now but he can speak.

Nick, are you with us?

Mr. Lawrence: I am with you.

Parks and Rec Commission: Summer Camp Program

Ms. Libby: So, we are coming down to the crunch here as Summer Camp is set to kick off on the 21st of June and we had some preliminary approvals from the Board in March to proceed with holding that programming here at the George B. White Building and understand that there are some air, some equipment in the building that needs to be updated.

We are in a place where we are just looking for the Board's blessing to hold summer camp here with the understanding that we will be using the facility as you continue to address the building needs as bids are received.

Selectman Dill: So, I was talking to John about this the other day and, because originally, we weren't going to have that Tuesday meeting and we weren't going to actually open these things for another three weeks.

I don't see it, when does summer camp start?

Ms. Libby: June 21st.

Selectman Dill: June 21st. Even if we open these Wednesday, we aren't going to have, I highly doubt that John is going to be done by June 21st but I think that if we have a contract in place and the people are, the contractor is going to get the job done, I would feel comfortable going ahead and bringing in summer camp is my take on it.

Vice Chairman Pitman: Cindy?

Selectwoman McHugh: But the job is not going to be done before summer camp starts.

Selectman Dill: That's my feeling.

Ms. Libby: And the expectation is that summer camp is predominantly outdoors.

Vice Chairman Pitman: Right.

Ms. Libby: The inside use would be for using the bathroom facilities and using it if there is a thunderstorm or lightening, you know, inclement weather days but really a large majority of the time is not spent inside at all.

Selectman McGarry: Yeah, I agree with Alden that they really need to be able to advise the parents that the Board supports and being able to proceed with so that they can make plans and I would go along with that.

Vice Chairman Pitman: I know that we don't have a full Board but sounds like the four that are here are in favor of this and can confirm it next Tuesday for you.

Mr. Shute: I think, I'd like to make us feel comfortable, I would like to see you guys make a motion that we get could get going on that assumption.

Selectman Dill: John had his hand up.

Mr. Harrington: Denny Greig and I had this discussion and both of us feel comfortable moving forward for the summer camp knowing that we will have the work done on the ventilation system sometime this year. Hopefully, very

soon after the start of it, it won't be at the start but again, it is predominantly outside. On those occasions where they do need to come inside, we will handle it just like any other inside environment. They can wear masks, stay socially distanced, windows opened, no air conditioning on. It's just take shelter and back outside again.

Motion: Selectman Dill moves to pursue summer camp as planned to start on the 21st with the understanding that we will have a contract with a provider for the air filtration system and with the stipulations that Mr. Harrington mentioned regarding masks and social distancing.

Discussion: Vice Chairman Pitman: Any other discussion? I just have one letter from Dwight Barnes who couldn't be here tonight and he's written a letter definitely in favor this going full speed ahead for summer camp. I want that in the minutes also.

Ms. Libby: Yes.

Selectman Dill: So, is it full? Are you still taking new ones?

Ms. Libby: I do not know.

Mr. Shute: I think that they are running a smaller program. In the past, it has to have been over one hundred so I think that it is kept smaller for that reason to keep the group smaller to follow the COVID stuff.

Mr. Shute: No, thank you. Appreciate it.

He was considering using calcium chloride on the gravel roads this summer to keep the dust down. I don't know if you want to say any more about it, Steve?

Mr. Rollins: Just wanted to know what your thoughts were and how you felt about it.

Vice Chairman Pitman: Any idea of the tonnage and the cost of it, Steve?

14 15

Mr. Rollins: I haven't looked into it. I didn't want to spend that kind of time to look into some that you guys (couldn't here).

Selectman Dill: Is this something that we have done before?

19 20 21

Mr. Rollins: No, we have not however Epsom does it. It does save grading time because obviously, the road doesn't get dried out washboards.

Selectman Dill: Especially this year when it is wicked dry. It's not a bad idea.

Mr. Rollins: Last year too.

25 26

Selectman Dill: Yeah.

27 28 29

Mr. Rollins: The only grading, Epsom only graded once. I believe, last year because they put down the calcium early.

We only graded a couple of times but mainly because it was dry and we weren't able to.

32 33

Selectman McGarry: This is something that is normally used in construction to keep the dust down and calcium chloride pulls the moisture out of the air and get the road, I won't say wet but damp.

Selectman Dill: It combines it together.

37 38

Selectman McGarry: Right.

39 40

Mr. Rollins: And, I have already gotten several calls on dirt roads for dust, which is to be expected.

41 42

Not much I can do about it.

43 44 45

Selectman Dill: I was going to say, what would we, would we have to buy equipment to do it?

46 47

Mr. Rollins: No, we actually have a calcium tank and we also have a tag that we can use to put it out.

48 49

Selectwoman McHugh: Steve, I think it is a good idea. I would like to see a price savings. You're saying that it would save time with the grader so let's subtract that from what the calcium would cost.

Mr. Rollins: Right.

Selectman Dill: It should prevent wash boarding.

55 56 Mr. Rollins: Right, the dry wash boards that you get in the summertime, it should take care of that.

Selectwoman McHugh: It takes a lot of fun away from the kids.

Mr. Rollins: Yeah, well, it makes the roads a lot safer. Those dry wash boards can be pretty scary. People need to slow down anyway.

Selectman Dill: You are looking, at the long-range forecast, just being pretty dry through August so I think that this is a good idea.

Vice Chairman Pitman: Can you come back to us Steve? We meet again Tuesday. Just a ballpark to see if this is an idea and where we would get the funds from. You have no idea what you are looking at though?

Thank you for what you are doing.

Anything else while you are here?

Mr. Rollins: Well, I was obviously late getting here. Was there anything else for me?

Vice Chairman Pitman: No. We are going to analyze, I call it the "gravel bid", and we are going to decide on next Tuesday.

Selectman Dill: Steve and I did track down an Eversource tree guy the other day. I was all excited about it and I went up and talked to Steve. He didn't mark any of the trees that I had mentioned.

Mr. Rollins: I finally did talk to him.

Selectman Dill: Good. The downside is that it looks like there is not that specialized ash borer group coming in.

Mr. Rollins: Actually, I talked to him.

Selectman Dill: Good!

Mr. Rollins: So, I talked to him Friday and he said that basically, I could mark trees, like he told you. He didn't have a lot of answers for me as to when they were coming to town, when they were doing what, where the crew was.

He called me back today with more answers and he said that he was going to call me back on Friday with more definite answers but it sounded like we have one crew coming to Deerfield to take any trees that I deemed necessary.

I said, well, any ash that were dead so he would like me to ride around and find trees that I thought were really, I mean I realize they are only going to cut the ones under the power lines but so, that's the plan kind of for tomorrow is to ride around, maybe, he was going to let me know on Friday how many trucks would be coming to town for sometime this summer. It did sound like we were definitely going to have at least one.

Selectman McGarry: Just advise on any scenic roads, we don't want them to cut.

Mr. Rollins: The dead ones too?

Selectman McGarry: Yes, we have to go through the public hearing process.

Mr. Rollins: Not for dead ones.

Selectman Dill: I thought that the dangerous trees could be taken.

Mr. Rollins: If it is a hazard then ...

Selectman McGarry: That's true.

Mr. Rollins: A dead tree is a hazard so.

Selectman Dill: They're looking for definite, especially hazardous trees is what this crew is looking for.

Mr. Rollins: I'm not looking at having them cut other trees. I just want them to take the dead ash or actually, any dead tree.

Selectman McGarry: Yeah. Yeah right.

Mr. Rollins: That potentially could be a problem.

Selectman Dill: My thought is that the more that Eversource can take, the longer Steve's tree budget lasts.

Mr. Rollins: Definitely.

Selectman Dill: I did stop every single Eversource and Asplundh truck I could find and this was the first person who was willing to work with us so I was happy with that.

60 61 62 Mr. Harrington: And Alden, to answer your question earlier, my proposal would be to use \$950.00 out of that community partnership grant and keep it out of the budget to lessen the impact.

Selectman Dill: Seems reasonable to me.

Vice Chairman Pitman: Very reasonable. I read the proposal. The number of lines is a lot.

Selectwoman McHugh: What about, does the parking lot need to be sealed first before we do that?

Mr. Ellis: The parking lot has some cracks in it that will need to be crack sealed eventually. It is still holding pretty good.

To seal it, I need to get bids to get it sealed. We did, I think, two years ago.

Mr. Harrington: The work has been in the last three budgets. That total amount is well over \$10,000.00 to have it sealed and lined but at this point, if I were waiting for it to be sealed, we wouldn't have any lines.

I think, in the short term, if we can put lines in the parking lot to assist customers coming in to this facility, I think that's the priority.

Mr. Ellis: With sixty-six parking spots.

Mr. Harrington: With that said, we are planning to coordinate for hopefully, a Monday and we will be talking to the police department and the town clerk because we will have to keep all vehicles out of the parking lot while this is being done and we are shooting for a Monday but we will coordinate with both departments so that they are aware of when this work might be done.

Mr. Ellis: And all employees can park across the street for the day.

Vice Chairman Pitman: If someone would like to make a motion.

Selectman Dill: How much is it again.

Selectwoman McHugh: \$950.00

Motion: Selectman Dill moves to spend \$950.00 to restripe the parking lot at the George B. White Building utilizing the community funds from Wheelabrator
